UN DAY: ARTISTIC ACTIVISM






future.

BIS MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Model United Nations has become more than a hobby for us. First, we progressed from performing as delegates to becoming co-chairs, and finally, chairs.

Then we came up with the idea of holding MUN at our school; we had all the resources, we just needed to put in a little effort. This was the first Model United Nations in the history of Kyrgyzstan, where the number of English committees exceeded that of the Russian ones; where we had committees such as UN Women, ECOSOC, UNHR (was







held in Russian) and UNESCO. In each committee, strong relationships were established between delegates and their chairs leading to the development of outstanding resolution papers. Many delegates often took unconventional approaches to complicated issues raised in each committee.

The event would not have taken place without our sponsors: the United Nations in the Kyrgyz Republic and Adriano Coffee.

The UN House has actively contributed to the development of the conference throughout the process which we really appreciated, and Dr. Ozonnia Ojielo, the UN Resident Coordinator Kyrgyz Republic kindly agreed to officially announce the opening ceremony of BIS MUN 2019.

We hope that BIS MUN will become an annual tradition in our school and will advance to an even higher level with the help of our students!

BIS ADVISORY COUNCIL – A BREATH OF FRESH AIR

BIS held the 21st meeting of the Advisory Council on 18th October, chaired by Eduard Auer, Ambassador, Head of the EU Delegation to Kyrgyzstan. David Grant (Head of School) and Hugh Salmon (Chair of the Governing Board) provided an update on school development and plans for a new campus before the main topic of the meeting 'Bishkek Air Quality and Student Health' was discussed. Presentations were given by representatives from SECO/Helvetas, AUCA, and Environmental Health Department of the Bishkek Mayor's office. This was followed by a lively discussion of action to be taken by different parties to improve air quality for all school students.

TURNING THE AIR GREEN

The air quality policy at BIS limits outside activity following United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) guidelines and monitoring via a PurpleAir sensor in the playground. To help automate the system, I have created an Air Pollution Monitoring System that automatically collects data from the playground PurpleAir sensor and displays the last 10 minutes average Air Quality Index (AQI) on a TV screen in the café. This screen automatically changes colour between AQI ranges and provides the current outside activity limits for this AQI. Information is displayed all day long in the cafe for any student or staff member and is constantly updated. In addition to the air purifiers in every room and the every air intake system which keeps AQI inside the school below 50, this adds another improvement in our approach to air quality.

Last 10 min AQI: 20 Good Range: 0-50 No Limit Last 10 min AQI: 165
Unhealthy Range: 150-200
Sensitive groups should avoid prolonged or heavy exertion.

Others should limit prolonged or heavy outdoor exertion. Increase rest periods & substitute players.

Last 10 min AQI: 70
Moderate Range: 50-100
No Limit.

Last 10 min AQI: 220
Very Unhealthy Range: 200-300
Sensitive groups should not be outside.

For others, restrict outdoor activities to light or moderate exercise.

Last 10 min AQI: 120
Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups Range: 100-150

Sensitive groups should limit prolonged or heavy exertion.

Increase rest periods and substitute players to lower breathing rates.

Last 10 min AQI: 320
Hazardous Range: 300-500
Avoid all physical activity outside.

Sensitive groups should stay inside and keep activity levels low.
